



REBUILDING LIVES

"Employment is the single biggest factor that contributes to a recovering addict's success." -Ty Reed

I couldn't agree more. There is nothing worse than being in a dark place with nothing to do but dwell on what you are struggling with. Addiction affects everyone. No one is immune to it, and here in the Pacific Northwest, Ty Reed's story below is a very relatable one.



Ty's father, Bill Reed, has lived in Mill Creek for 26 years. He spent six and a half years working for Microsoft and another 18 working for Everett Community College. He had this to say about his son's recovery.

"That time was really hard on us and on me as a parent. We thankfully live in a world where people get second chances and when individuals within the community see someone trying

to do the right thing, they often jump in to help. I am grateful to live in such a welcoming community. I'm really proud of what Ty has done. He was always a smart kid and my hope for his future is that he is able to use that brilliance to help those who would not have otherwise received the support they needed without him."

As our conversation moved forward, Ty brought up a compelling question. Should we be continuously punished for who we were on our worst day? He explains.

"After I got sober I had tons of resources for rebuilding my personal life - therapists, 12-step programs, and other support groups to help me emotionally - but when it came to working there was nothing. Even with all of my award-winning work experience in the corporate world and my MBA, I still had to get a job as a janitor. I can only imagine what someone who doesn't have any experience would have to go through. You have individuals that go through a dark period in their life with homelessness or drug addiction and when they get through that time, there is nowhere for them to go and no one wants to hire them. That is what I want to change. There are so many people out there who went through a hard time that have so much to offer the world and I want to help them get access to resources."

I believe Ty not only understands where this gap in help is but he is building towards a useful solution. Ty, I believe in your mission and applaud your bravery for continuing to push forward. I know I'm not the only one in your corner.

In 2006 Ty had it all. He had achieved great success in sales at the national level for a Fortune 500 company. He was on his way to completing an MBA in marketing and entrepreneurship. He was married and had a beautiful home, but addiction takes over slowly. Ty struggled with alcohol and drug addictions that eventually consumed everything he had, and more. Over the course of the next 10 years, Ty lost everything. This dark period in his life culminated in a two-year period of homelessness which included jail time and suicide attempts.

But despite this story's tragic beginning, it thankfully has a happy ending as in March of 2016, Ty began to get sober. This sobriety brought clarity to his mind and with that newfound clarity came his desire to have a positive impact on his community. "As I got sober, I began to think about ways to give back to my community. I realized there were lots of resources available for getting you clean, but very little in the way of getting you back to work. This realization was the birthplace of my nonprofit, Recovery Career Services," says Ty.

"We focus on everything related to employment in recovery with the launch of our new website at recoveryandwork.org. If you need helping writing a resume or need interview practice, we can do that. If you need help with career coaching or you just need someone to talk you through the job-hunting process, we will be there for that as well. We meet people where they are. If you have been sober for one day, 30 days, or beyond, we will meet you where you are in the process. My hope is that I can take this terrible experience and turn this moment into a brighter one by helping others who were in the same place I was." -Ty

Picture yourself walking up a neighborhood street one sunny afternoon, rounding the corner at the top of a hill, and spying a sea of bicycles dotting the hillside with color, each wrapped with a brightly colored bow. This was my experience one Sunday in early May, and what makes it all the more stunning in my mind is the reason behind the scene. Let me share a story with you.

Shannon and Everette Anderson are loving parents who have fostered over forty kids since 2009. In addition to the necessary state licensing, they are certified as a Native licensed foster home. Currently, they are raising their two biological teens and two adopted children, ranging in age from 4 years old up to age 19.

It's not unusual for youngsters to arrive at a new foster home with nothing but the clothes on their backs. Unfortunately, there are fewer resources for foster parents than one would think (financial or otherwise), and Shannon estimates the average initial investment to outfit an incoming child with basic supplies is \$300 to \$500. Five years ago, she says it dawned on her that one of the items most often lacking for kids is a bicycle of their own. As we all know, these can come with hefty price tags, especially if several are needed each year to accommodate various sizes, ages, and physical limitations. That's when a lightbulb went on in her head.

Shannon decided to reach out to Mill Creek Free Gifting and her Buy Nothing group, both private Facebook free gifting groups. She submitted a request for some bikes to be donated for foster families. That first year, she asked for 10 bikes, and the groups donated 65. Fast forward to 2021. If you just so happened to walk by the Anderson house in April, you'd have seen 223 sitting in the garage.

In order to procure donations and advertise the annual Foster Kid Bike Drive, Shannon spreads the word on the two Facebook groups mentioned above. She then collects the gifted bikes throughout the month of April. She estimates that 80% are donated by Mill Creek Free Gifting and the remainder come from all types of people... school teachers, local families, residents from their home state of Alaska, and one surprising group some may not be familiar

with. "The Everett area has a very active Narcotics Anonymous (NA) group who has amazing participants that look for ways to give back to the community. These are people who are currently in recovery and contributing members of society, and some have had children of their own in the foster system who are now assisting with the project. Several members of their group helped us gather bikes this year and were so supportive of our efforts," Shannon says.

How do foster parents find out about the program? Well, another organization that supports foster families has a hand in that. The Treasure Chest Kids' Clothing Closet in Monroe graciously affords the Andersons the opportunity to post the available bikes on their site. Interested foster, adoptive, and kinship families provide their names, kids' ages, and approximate sizes. As information is submitted and bicycles are received, Shannon begins deciding which bike will be a perfect match for each individual child. But the actual delivery doesn't happen just yet.

Rewind to the magnificent spectacle I witnessed on that Sunday afternoon in May. It just so happens it was the all-day work party the Andersons organize each year. A colorful cross-section of the community turns out to selflessly volunteer their time and talents in order to detail and wash each and every bike until it shines like new again. In Shannon's words, "It is beautiful, organized chaos." She'd like to give a shout-out to the manager and employees of Bicycle Centres of Silverlake who have also been extremely helpful and supportive when it comes to supplying the parts for repairs.

After each bike's transformation is complete, it is wrapped with a cheerful bow and a tag displaying the recipient's name. The families are notified that it's time to pick up their "wheels" and this is when the magic truly happens. The Andersons

describe what a blessing it is to see the look on a child's face when they receive what is, many times, their very first bicycle. They recall one

teenager staring in wideeyed disbelief, then bursting into tears when she realized the bike was hers to keep. Foster

parents have also received bikes so they have the ability to ride as a family. Countless foster parents have shared how humbled they are that so many people care so much.

This year, 223 bikes were gifted to their perfect home. Clearly, Shannon has uncovered a genuine need and our local community is rallying to meet it.

Making Big Connections in the Classroom

Heidi Little has been a part of the Everett School District for as long as she can remember. Her history in the district does not start with her, however. Heidi's family members have both attended and taught at local schools for years. "We are definitely rooted in the educational system in Everett, to say the least," Little said.

Heidi has lived in Everett her whole life and went through Everett Public Schools herself. Her grandfather, who was a teacher in the Everett School District, was her role model growing up. She knew from a young age she wanted to be a teacher and set out to do so at Western Washington University, the same school her grandfather attended. Heidi earned her Bachelor's degree in English and her teacher's certificate there before returning to Everett.

While looking for her student teaching placement, Heidi knew she wanted to be in the district and was placed at Jackson High School. "I really love the community," Heidi said. "I love our students and our parents, and the staff is amazing. My best friends work here, too." In her 14th year of teaching, Heidi currently teaches AP Literature but has taught a variety of English courses to all grade levels.

"I love teaching ninth grade," Heidi said. "I love helping kids enter their high school career and helping them transition that way. I've also just had such a love for teaching the upperclassmen and have enjoyed being the person who gets to help them transition into their lives outside of school. I feel very lucky. I get the bookends and I get really the best of both worlds."

One such student is sophomore Payton Huber, who nominated Heidi for the Above and Beyond Award that honors teachers who have been extraordinary educators, especially over the past year. "She has the ability to create a welcoming environment — one where students can be themselves — even through a computer screen," Payton said. "I feel so blessed to be in her class and to know her at all. She is the kind of person who shapes lives for the better, the kind of teacher you never forget."

When Heidi became a teacher, she had no idea how close she would become to her students. "It's a connection," Heidi said. "I just think about all the kids that I still get to hear from on social media who tell me they're getting married or having kids, or who saw a reference to a story, screenshot it, and sent it to me. It's those little things like that. We still have those connections, even across time and space.



It's so much more than just knowing how to use a semicolon which is also important to me."

Heidi's teaching philosophy is derived from a quote by Maya Angelou: "People will forget what you said, people will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel."

"I don't necessarily remember every lesson plan for every assignment or things certain teachers did," Heidi said. "What I remember about the teachers is how they made me feel. They made me feel smarter, they made me feel encouraged, and they made me feel seen."

Heidi tries to do the same for her students. She listens to them and gets to know them through not only curriculum, but also conversation. "In the classroom you start building relationships with kids," Heidi said. "And you're like, I'm going to start getting to know their personalities and their heartaches and their joys. You get to celebrate with them and comfort them and learn from them."

Heidi and her husband of nine years have two cats and reside in the Riverside community in north Everett. Heidi is proud to be nominated for the Above and Beyond Award but emphasized the multitude of educators who are deserving of recognition.

"I'd like to thank my colleagues," Heidi said, "because I was a very different teacher at the beginning of my career. It's more than the individual. It's such a group effort. It's a collaborative job between the kids, the other staff members — it's everybody working together."

INGREDIENTS:

- 1/3 cup oil, olive or avocado
- O 8 cloves garlic, crushed
- 1½ Tbsp ginger grated on a microplane, or minced with a chef's knife
- ${\color{red}\mathsf{O}} \quad 2 \ \mathrm{tsp} \ \mathrm{crushed} \ \mathrm{red} \ \mathrm{pepper} \ \mathrm{flakes}$
- O $1\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt
- O 2 pounds wild shrimp (16-20 count) peeled and deveined
- 2 Tbsp chopped parsley for garnish
- O Lemon wedges for serving

SERVING IDEAS: When it's hot in the summer, we like these spicy skewers with something cool, like Cole Slaw or Fennel Salad. But if you want a bit more to eat, steamed rice and grilled asparagus or zucchini is delicious. Why not make "kebobs" by skewering cubes of zucchini and fresh pineapple with the shrimp ... oh man! So good. And for an appetizer, you can use cocktail picks to make mini skewers!

NOTE: If this recipe sounds great but you don't have a grill, you can also sauté the shrimp in a skillet on the stove without skewering them. Get the skillet piping hot!

METHOD:

- 1. If using bamboo skewers, soak them for at least 30 minutes to help keep them from catching fire on the grill. I like to soak them for 24 hours, then wrap them and keep them in the freezer. When I want to skewer anything for the grill, they are ready to go!
- 2. Mix oil, garlic, ginger, crushed red pepper, and salt in a bowl, then add the shrimp. Stir to coat as evenly as possible.
- 3. Thread five shrimp onto each skewer ... or as many as will fit comfortably depending on the size of the skewers.
- 4. You can mix the spices with the shrimp and even skewer them ahead of time and let them hang out in the fridge for a while to marinate or you can grill immediately.
- 5. Heat the grill to high heat, then lay the skewers on. Cook on one side 2-3 minutes (you'll see them start to turn orange some people call it pink), then turn to finish cooking on the other side. It should only take about 5-7 minutes.
- 6. Garnish with chopped parsley and serve with lemon wedges.

ince 1987, the Superintendent's Scholar Award has been supported by the Everett Public Schools Foundation as a way to honor students for academic excellence. And since 2018, Drs. Gary and Sue Cohn have sponsored the \$1,000 for each of those four winners.

The three finalists for each high school are in the top 5% of their graduating class according to GPA, and one winner from each of the four high schools is chosen. The finalists are all interviewed by a selection committee of community members, teachers, and Everett Public Schools Foundation Board members, and are asked to select a staff

member who has made a difference in their life.



Happily, Laura met her current husband, Matt, online. She was living in Mill Creek, while he had spent his whole life further north in Mount Vernon. "We are both runners," Laura continues, "and we bonded over our interest in fitness." The couple moved to Mill Creek together and married in 2015.
